2010 MUNICIPAL ELECTION

CANDIDATES

Persons wishing to seek elected municipal or school board office should read the relevant legislation and regulations for qualifications required for the office, e.g., the Municipal Act, 2001, the Education Act, and the Municipal Elections Act, 1996.

It is the responsibility of the candidate to determine whether he or she is qualified to be elected to and hold office.

Candidates can only be nominated for one office on a municipal council or school board in the Province of Ontario at a time. If person is nominated for a second office, the first nomination is deemed to be withdrawn.

Qualification – Municipal Office

A candidate for municipal office must, upon nomination, be a qualified municipal elector and fulfil all of the following requirements

- a resident of the municipality, a non-resident owner or tenant of land in the municipality or the spouse of such non-resident owner or tenant;
- a Canadian citizen;
- at least 18 years old;
- not legally prohibited from voting; and
- not disqualified by any legislation from holding municipal office.

NOTE: A candidate, if nominated, must remain qualified throughout the election and, if elected, throughout the term of office.

Qualification – School Board

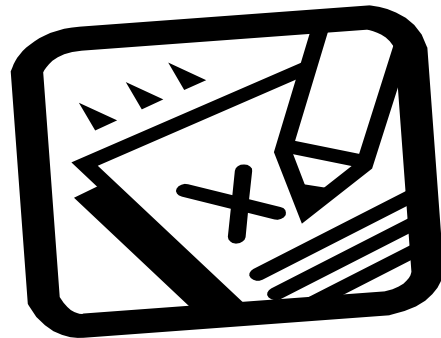
A candidate for a school board must, upon nomination, be a qualified municipal elector and fulfill all of the following requirements:

a resident within the jurisdiction of the board;

- a supporter of the board;
- a Canadian citizen;
- at least 18 years old;
- Roman Catholic (if running for a separate school board);
- not legally prohibited from voting; and
- not disqualified by any legislation from holding school board office.

NOTE: A candidate, if nominated, must remain qualified throughout the election and, if elected, throughout the term of office. School board candidates should confirm that they have the qualifications described in section 219 of the Education Act.

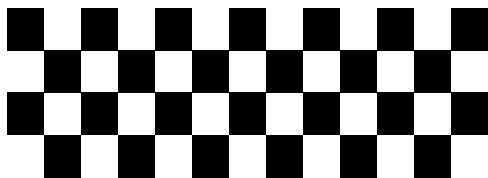

INFORMATION

1. Maximum size of an Election sign is 1.486 m²² (16 ft²) for each sign face.
2. Shall only be erected, located or displayed on private property
3. Sign is not to be erected, located or displayed earlier than twenty-eight (28) days prior to voting day, with the exception of signage at a Campaign Office
4. Election signs are to be removed no later than three (3) days after voting day of the election.

VOTE BY MAIL

Vote by Mail was first introduced in the 2006 Municipal Election in the Town of Ingersoll. Due to the increased voter turnout (over 50% return), voters will receive a Voter's Kit shortly after SEPTEMBER 28TH, 2010.

The Kit will include an information sheet together with a detachable Declaration Form, a ballot & envelope and a return self-addressed **YELLOW** envelope.

Please remember to sign the Form making a declaration that you are a Canadian Citizen and 18 years years of age and have not already voted in this municipality.

Place the Ballot into the envelope marked "Ballot" and insert into the yellow envelope together with the signed Declaration form and drop into the mail box. The final day to deposit the Return Voting Envelope in the mail to ensure delivery to the Clerk is **Saturday, October 16, 2010.**

After October 16, 2010, ballots are to be dropped off at the Town Office. A voting station will be available from the mailing date to **8:00 p.m. on October 25th, 2010** at the Town Office.

Help Your Emergency Services



On November 9, 2009 Ingersoll Town Council implemented "Building Numbering Bylaw 09-4510". This bylaw will come into effect October 1, 2010 and will require municipal address numbers be attached to the front of your house or business. You may know where you live or work but Emergency Services rely on these numbers to locate addresses in a hurry. Address numbers should be large and easily seen at all times. Vegetation or non contrasting small numerals can make it very difficult to see from the street.

Residential house address numbers shall be at least 127 millimeters (5 inches) high and shall be located so as to be clearly visible from the street on to which the building has its main access.

If the residential building is set back to such an extent, or is otherwise located on the site so that the municipal address number is not clearly visible from the street onto which the building has its access, then a permanent sign of durable material approved by the Chief Building Official having numbers at least 127 millimeters high (5 inches) shall be placed and maintained within the property limits near the street access so that the municipal address number is clearly visible from the street.

The owner of a commercial, industrial, institutional or apartment building shall firmly affix to and maintain on the front of the building the municipal address number which shall be at least 200 millimeters (8 inches) high.

When cutting grass please don't blow the clippings out onto the roadway. These clippings are washed down onto the catch-basin lids causing possible flooding on the roadway and homeowners property. Grass clippings and other garden wastes can be taken to the Yard Waste & Brush Depot at 80 Pemberton Street for composting.

During those hot days of summer remember your plants aren't the only things that need water. Don't forget your trees. Here are a few tips for watering:

Young trees (up to 2 years old) should be watered at the base and then expand outward as the tree grows.

Mature trees should not be watered at the trunk but instead irrigate from the dripline (the furthest edge the trees leaves extend) outward. The distance will depend on the size of the tree and the nature of the tree's root system. As a rule of thumb apply water in a circular band that's at least half as wide as the distance from the trunk to the dripline.

In times of drought and water restrictions trees should be given priority over other landscape plants including lawns. It takes trees many years to reach maturity. Grass left unwatered will naturally go dormant and turn brown but will turn green again with rains or being watered.



Water trees slowly to allow the soil to be moistened two to three feet deep. Most of a tree's water absorbing roots are in the top 12 to 24 inches of soil.



Summer is the time when crews are busy repairing roads and walks. Please exercise extra caution in and around work zones with worker safety a priority.

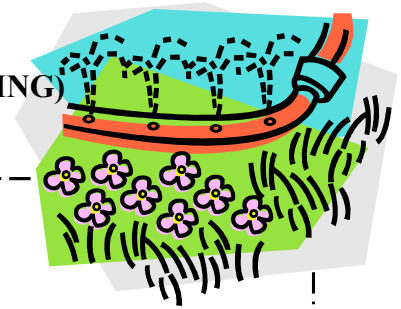
WERE YOU AWARE OF THE NEW BY-LAW?

Smoking outdoors within 9 meters of any Town owned sports field (soccer, baseball, splash pad, playground equipment, spectator seating area, etc) is NOT PERMITTED

Smoking within 9 meters of any Town facility entrance (Town Office, Arena, Seniors Centre, VPCC, Police, Fire, Fusion, etc) Is NOT PERMITTED.



**OUTSIDE WATER USE BY-LAW
MAY 1ST TO SEPTEMBER 30TH, 2010
(INCLUDES LAWN WATERING & CAR WASHING)**



Ingersoll residents are to follow the schedule below:

- Even numbered **homes** can water from 6 – 9 am and 6 – 9 pm on **even** numbered days.
- Even numbered **businesses** can water from 8 – 10 am and 3 – 5 pm on **even** numbered days.
- Odd numbered **homes** can water from 6 – 9 am and 6 – 9 pm on **odd** numbered days.
- Odd numbered **businesses** from 8 – 10 am and 3 – 5 pm on **odd** numbered days.

Exemption Permits for watering new sod, seed or trees for an initial 5 day period are available for no fee by calling Oxford County. Permits are required for Fund Raising activities such as car washes, free of charge. A Permit is required for all automatic sprinkler systems and there is no fee if a water meter is being used. Permits are sent by email, fax or mailed to your home or business. There are no restrictions on children’s sprinklers or wading pools.

County staff will be patrolling throughout Ingersoll on a regular basis and will issue warnings where warranted. If there is a 2nd violation the water pressure to the property may be reduced and a \$75 charge applies to have the pressure returned to normal.

DID YOU KNOW ?

SIGNAGE POSTING

NO Signs are to be posted on Thames St. between Bell to Canterbury, portions of King St. and Charles St.

YARD/GARAGE Sale Signs posted in designated areas are to be made of paper or cardboard and affixed only with tape.

Signs are only allowed to be posted for a period 24 hours prior to the sale and to be removed within 24 hours of the completion of the sale.



BY-LAW NO. 08-4431

Prohibits the placing of objects on any highway or highway allowance.

Objects placed in the road allowance or on the road may pose a safety hazard to pedestrians and drivers.

BUILDING NUMBERING

As of October 1, 2010, all buildings are required to have municipal address numbers attached to the front of your house or business.

COMMUNITY IMPROVEMENT PLAN

The Town of Ingersoll is in the process of developing a Community Improvement Plan (CIP) under section 28 of the Planning Act.

CIPS allow municipalities to provide financial incentives to support the improvement and rehabilitation of defined areas.

A public meeting was held on March 31, 2010 at which time input was received from the community to determine objectives, goals, and scope of the Ingersoll CIP.

Town staff has begun to put together a framework for the CIP which will outline the geographical area with the 5 or 6 key focuses for grant programs, tax assistance and other incentive programs.

INGERSOLL BUSINESS IMPROVEMENT AREA

OPERATING SHARING—Did you know that for over 27 years, **Operation Sharing** has been a not-for-profit organization that has served Oxford County.

In May 2008, “the Meeting Place, Ingersoll” was opened at the Upper Deck Youth Centre, at 1 Charles Street East, Ingersoll.

Integrated and holistic, with an emphasis on dignity and respect, our services help not only those in need, but the community as a whole. Operation Sharing promotes empowerment through responding proactively to the needs of the community.

At “The Meeting Place”, patrons are invited to come by for a cup of coffee, a light lunch and take time to talk/share. Families and individuals in need of emergency food assistance can receive a specially designed “Food for Friends” card in pre-determined denominations.

TREASURER'S REPORT – JULY 2010

This report is directed to the residents and taxpayers of the Town of Ingersoll to provide an update on financial matters of the municipality.

Council approved our 2010 budget on May 17, 2010 and included a 3.5% levy increase (after growth) over 2009. The 2010 budget had a number of funding cut backs as well as increased debenture financing charges due to the 1/3 shared Infrastructure Stimulus Projects. This had a significant impact on the overall net levy and therefore requiring a very tight budget to come in at only a 3.5% increase for 2010.

The 2010 Capital Budget saw a 5.2% (\$440,000) reduction in levy requirements over 2009 with only \$279,000 levy dollars used for our 2010 Capital budget.

Some of the factors affecting this year budget increases are as follows;

- CPI Increase (inflation)

- Pay Equity/2009 incr Staff Compliment/OPP

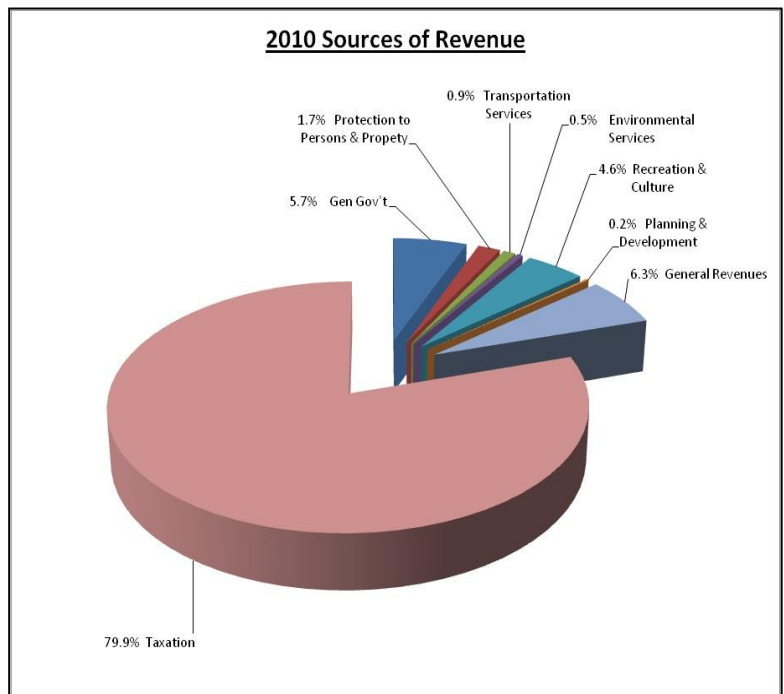
It should be noted that this budget includes a net reduction in our Reserves and Reserve Funds of \$123,000.

A municipal levy increase of 3.5% on an average residential property with an assessed value of \$205,000 (avg. value for Ingersoll) will realize a net annual tax decrease of (\$19.77) or -1.2% over 2009 provided your residential property was not subject to the 2nd Year Phase In of the Current Value Assessment (CVA) program. Our 2010 Residential Tax Rates have decreased as a result of the 2nd year of the CVA Four Year Phase In.

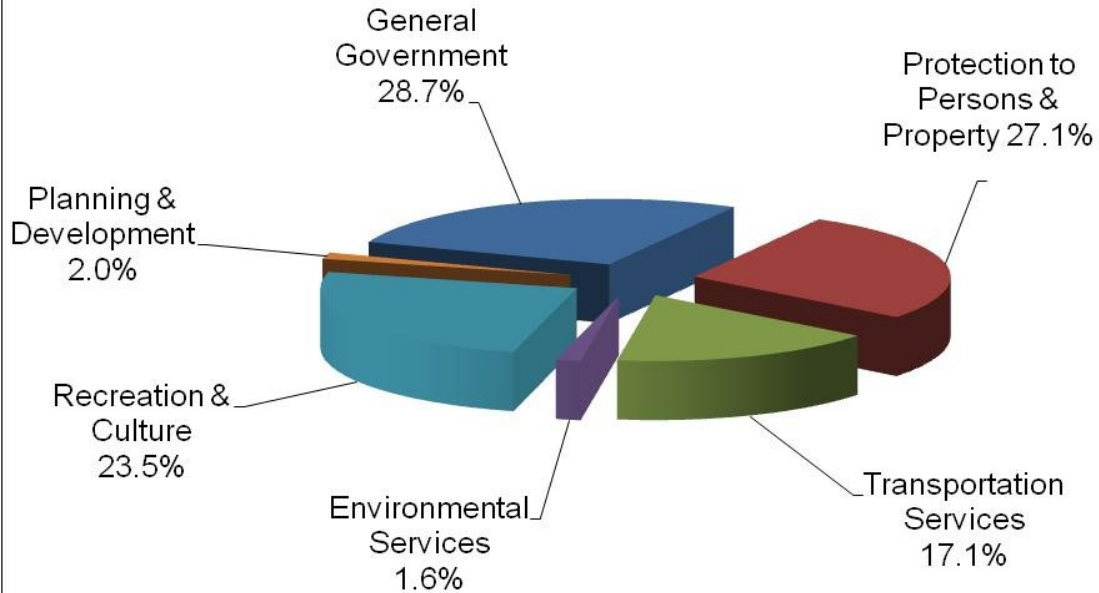
In closing, I would like to express my appreciation to all Department Heads and support staff in assisting me in preparing and presenting this 2010 Budget to Council.

Building Permits Requirements for Solar Collectors and Wind Turbine Generators

In 2009, the “Green Energy and Green Economy Act”, was implemented by the Province of Ontario. This Act altered the planning approvals process for renewable energy projects, established a more aggressive tariff system for renewable energy fed into the grid and to stimulate the development of a smart grid. This Act has stimulated home owners and business to install renewable energy systems in Ingersoll. In order to ensure the citizens of Ingersoll that these systems are installed safely, the Ontario Building Code has outlined requirements for building permits for these Designated Structures as shown below:

Solar Collectors

The OBC under Section 1.3.1.1 (f) Designated Structures requires solar collectors that is mounted on a building and has a face area equal to or greater than 5 sq. m or 54 sq. ft. to have a building permit.

Note: Under the OBA a building means a structure occupying an area greater than ten square metres (107sq.ft).

Wind Turbines

Wind Turbines require permits under section 1.3.1.1(g) Designated Structures, for a structure that supports a wind turbine generator having a rated output of more than 3kW.

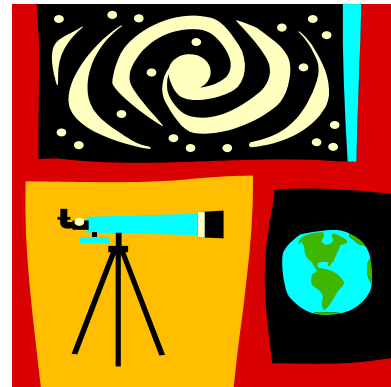
Therefore, building permits will be issued by the Town of Ingersoll Building Department for the solar collectors and wind turbines that meet the OBC requirements.

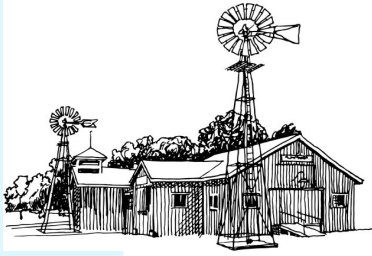
Cost of Permits.

A permit will be issued for each structure at a cost of \$80.00 up to \$10,000 construction value, plus \$9.00 each additional \$1000 above \$10,000 of construction value.

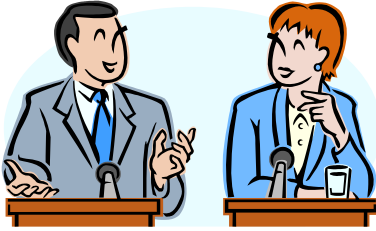

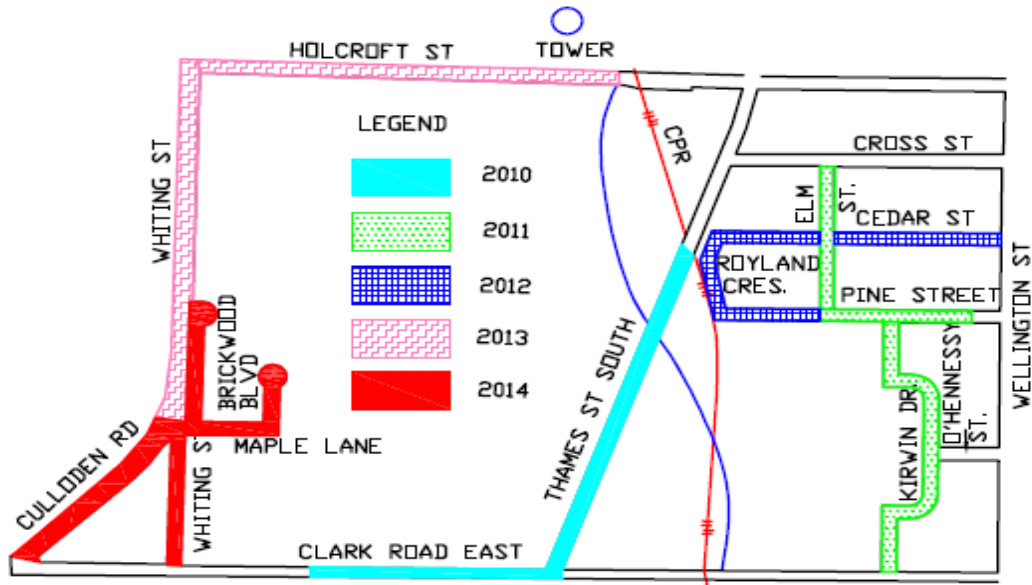
